1. Call to Order

After confirming all participants could hear and be heard, President Griesemer declared the presence of a quorum, called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. and announced audio and video recording by Amherst Media.

Note: Pursuant to Governor Baker’s March 12, 2020 Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §18, this meeting of the Town Council was conducted via remote participation.

3. Hearings

a. 6:30 pm – Public Hearing: Eversource request to install two jointly owned poles on Belchertown Road

President Griesemer stated that the hearing is held per Massachusetts General Law Chapter 166, Section 22 the requires that the Council hold a public hearing on the petition of any utility provider to construct or locate poles, conduit or underground wires for the transmission of electricity.

This hearing is on the May 12, 2020 petition of Eversource to install two (2) jointly owned poles on Belchertown Road. The first to be set is 9/70 M, placed in line with and approximately 128 feet southeasterly of existing pole 9/70. The pole center line is approximately 27 feet from the road center line. The second is 9/71m to be placed in line with and approximately 100 feet southeasterly of existing pole 9/71. The pole center line is approximately 33 feet from Belchertown Road center line, 67 feet from Harkness Road Center line and approximately 23 feet to the left of a fire hydrant.

As required by statute, written notice of the time and place of the hearing was mailed on July 27, 2020 to all owners of real estate abutting the proposed pole locations.

The Department of Public Works has recommended approval of this petition and reminds the petitioner that a street opening permit must be obtained prior to commencing work.

President Griesemer opened the public hearing.

Eversource Representative Carla Trosino-Laramy was available for questions.

Councilor Schoen asked if the poles would get in the way of a sidewalk.

Trosino-Laramy responded that poles may be moved if needed in the future.

DPW Superintended Guilford Mooring added that there is plenty of room in that section of Belchertown Road.

Councilor Steinberg stated that in the past, objections were made after a pole hearing regarding shade trees, and the Town Manager responded to a question that the Tree Warden saw no issue with the poles.

Councilor De Angelis asked about 5G technology in Amherst regarding this request.

G. Mooring responded that there is no 5G in this specific area, there is 5G in other areas, and there is no known plan to add 5G at this point.

There were no public comments or questions.

Seeing no other questions or comments, President Griesemer closed the public hearing.

b. 6:30 pm – Public Hearing: Eversource request to install two jointly owned poles on Blue Hills Road and Orchard Street

President Griesemer stated that per Massachusetts General Law Chapter 166, Section 22 the requires that the Council hold a public hearing on the petition of any utility provider to construct or locate poles, conduit or underground wires for the transmission of electricity.

This hearing is on the May 27, 2020 petition of Eversource to install two (2) jointly owned poles. The first to be set is #13/1S to be placed directly across from 13/1 on Blue Hills Road and will support the reverse corner from moving poles on the main road due to MassDOT Road Project. The second is #99/EII to be placed approximately six feet from fire hydrant on Orchard Street. This Pole is need due to Mass DOT Road Project as well and will support a single-phase side tap that feeds Orchard Street. Also, both poles will have down guys and anchors.

As required by statute, written notice of the time and place of the hearing was mailed on July 27, 2020 to all owners of real estate abutting the proposed pole locations.

The Department of Public Works has recommended approval of this petition and reminds the petitioner that a street opening permit must be obtained prior to commencing work.

President Griesemer opened the public hearing.

Councilor Hanneke asked if the poles will be permanent or temporary due to construction.

G. Mooring responded that it is a new crossing, this is a permanent pole that will serve Northampton Road.

Hanneke asked about limiting the number of times the lines cross the streets.

G. Mooring responded that the location is required and will reduce the number of poles and guy wires along the line.

There were no public comments or questions.

Seeing no further questions or comments, President Griesemer closed the public hearing.

4. General Public Comment

Carol Gray, Amherst resident, asked about the timing of public comment regarding the polling locations, and asked that public comment be taken at the start of every Council meeting.

Isolda Ortega-Bustamante spoke about the passing of Representative John Lewis, stated that the Public Health Director did not contribute to the plan to consolidate polling locations, spoke about mail-in voting, election workers, and spoke in opposition to making a permanent change to the polling locations.

John Bonifaz asked about how much time will be given to public comment later in the meeting.

Gabriel Davila stated that public comments regarding voting and policing should be taken up earlier in the meeting.

Councilor Brewer stated that not all committees take public comment at the beginning of each meeting, and that there is a disconnect about what public comment is for and that it is not a time for a dialogue with the Council.

Councilor DuMont asked that if we are not responding to comments, why a comment was taken from a Councilor.

Agenda item 6.a. Resolution Regarding The Holyoke Soldiers Home

Director of Veterans' Services Steven Connor spoke about the Holyoke Soldiers' Home, the needs of the facility that were not addressed for many years and which allowed COVID-19 to spread rapidly through the facility. There is a coalition of veteran services officers, family members of veterans who have passed, family members of veterans living in the home currently, and others, and the coalition is asking the Town to support the resolution.

Councilor Ryan reported the Governance, Organization, and Legislation Committee found the resolution clear, consistent, and actionable.

Councilor Pam spoke in support of the resolution.

Connor stated that he has received calls from veterans' families looking for a place at the Soldiers' Home.

Agenda Item 8.b. Eversource Pole Petitions

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 via Consent Agenda to suspend Town Council Rules of Procedure rule 8.4 for the current agenda item.

MOTION: President Griesemer moved, second by Councilor Hanneke, to approve the order for pole locations on Belchertown Road titled “ORDER FOR JOINT OR IDENTICAL POLE LOCATIONS” dated May 12, 2020.

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 by roll call to approve the order for pole locations on Belchertown Road titled “ORDER FOR JOINT OR IDENTICAL POLE LOCATIONS” dated May 12, 2020.

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 via Consent Agenda to suspend Town Council Rules of Procedure rule 8.4 for the current agenda item.

MOTION: President Griesemer moved, second by Councilor Hanneke, to approve the order for pole locations on Blue Hills Road and Orchard Street titled “ORDER FOR JOINT OR IDENTICAL POLE LOCATIONS” dated May 27, 2020.

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 by roll call to approve the order for pole locations on Blue Hills Road and Orchard Street titled “ORDER FOR JOINT OR IDENTICAL POLE LOCATIONS” dated May 27, 2020.

Agenda Item 8.e. Leverett Extension of Water Line

G. Mooring spoke about the proposed extension of the water line into the Town of Leverett.

Councilor Schoen asked about how much consumption will be added to the water system.

Mooring responded that it is a small volume of water users, and they will be charged the same rate as Amherst consumers.

Leverett Selectboard Member Peter d’Errico spoke about the collaboration between the Towns as a joint community effort that will benefit Leverett and Amherst residents.

MOTION: President Griesemer moved, second by Councilor Hanneke, to suspend Town Council Rules of Procedure rule 8.4 for the current agenda item.

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 by roll call to suspend Town Council Rules of Procedure rule 8.4 for the current agenda item.

MOTION: President Griesemer moved, second by Councilor Steinberg, to authorize the Town Manager to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement under MGL Chapter 40 Section 4A for the purpose of extending the Town of Amherst public water supply into Leverett 9,100 LF to serve certain houses that are downgradient of the closed and capped Leverett Landfill.

Councilor Brewer stated that she would prefer to see the final agreement but that this draft is adequate and is willing to move forward.

VOTED Unanimously 13-0 by roll call to authorize the Town Manager to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement under MGL Chapter 40 Section 4A for the purpose of extending the Town of Amherst public water supply into Leverett 9,100 LF to serve certain houses that are downgradient of the closed and capped Leverett Landfill.

Agenda item 7.c. North Amherst Library Update

Town Manager Paul Bockelman stated that an anonymous donor has offered to donate funds in order to build an addition to the North Amherst Library.

Kuhn Riddle representative Chris Farley spoke about the proposed addition, placement, accessible entry, preservation of the front and south building facades, new accessible bathrooms, meeting room, storage area, and other changes to the building and parking lot.

Councilor Pam asked about the roof pitch.

Farley responded that the ceiling area will be used for electrical and duct work, but the ceiling will be higher, and spoke about the use of the hydraulic lift.

Councilor Schoen asked how many people the meeting room will hold, about weekend and after-hours access, if there would be a space saving if the bathrooms were rearranged, and about the stairs leading to the downstairs bathroom.

Farley responded that the room could accommodate about 40 people, there could be study of European-style bathrooms, and that the lower bathroom will be removed and repurposed for library storage.

Town Manager Paul Bockelman added that the Town is transitioning to key card access to spaces, and that would allow access to the meeting room after-hours.

Councilors discussed other building features.

Bockelman spoke about the community engagement process and the unique opportunity for the Town.

Agenda Item 7.d. Energy and Climate Action Committee Update

Sustainability Coordinator Stephanie Ciccarello and Energy and Climate Action Committee Chair Laura Draucker spoke about the committee's work and development of the Town of Amherst Climate Action and Resilience Plan timeline.

Agenda Item 8.a. Elections

Town Manager Paul Bockelman and Town Clerk Shavena Martin spoke about the purpose of the location change.

Councilors discussed the proposed polling location, concerns regarding COVID-19, accessibility, transportation, voting by mail and early voting, voter confusion, and how to advertise a polling location change.

Town Clerk Shavena Martin spoke about a ballot box to be placed outside Town Hall to collect voted ballots, the use of electronic poll books that will reduce wait time for voters at the polls, and the need for a change in light of COVID-19.

Councilors discussed how to reduce barriers and reduce confusion about moving a polling location.

Superintendent of Schools Michael Morris stated that when schools reopen, visitors will not be allowed in the school buildings and that teachers and staff have expressed concerns about voters in the school buildings. Morris stated that it will make the school community very uncomfortable to have voters in the building and young children in the same area less than 12 hours later. There were safety concerns pre-COVID-19 with voting at Crocker Farm School.

Public Comment

Jeff Mazur, Amherst resident, stated that it is important to listen to constituents who are saying that moving the polling location will be a problem, and that polling places should not change between September and November elections.

Gabriel Davila, Amherst resident, stated Hampshire College provides transportation to polling places, that it makes sense to close the least amount of polling locations, and that lines at the polls will deter voters.

Myra Ross agreed with the previous speaker, that there will be long lines, and suggested moving some of the polling locations to various locations within the high school.

Carol Gray, Amherst resident, stated that the proposal is draconian and that the CDC has recommended a greater number of polling locations rather than fewer, suggested drive-up voting, stated that it is critical to have voting available for university students, spoke about long lines in bad weather, and commented about rejected mail-in ballots.

Meg Gage, Amherst resident, stated that the Town Clerk has tried to deal with real challenges, that the solution is not to change voting for everyone, spoke about COVID-19 contact tracing, and urged the Council to take a middle path when making changes to polling locations.

John Bonifaz, Amherst Resident and cofounder of Free Speech For People, spoke about his experience with voting rights law, spoke about concerns regarding COVID-19, and spoke in favor of retaining the current polling locations.

Sue Lowery stated that a quarter mile walk would disenfranchise disabled voters who cannot walk from a bus stop to the high school.

A young Amherst resident spoke in opposition to the change of polling locations to the high school and stated that reducing polling locations following the Council's decision not to reduce the police department's budget would be a blow to residents of color.

Zoe Crabtree spoke about transportation issues that voters may face in getting to the polls on Election Day, and that the return rate on vote by mail ballots will be lower than expected.

Barbara Ford, Amherst resident, spoke about experience as a warden, and stated that free transportation to the polls would help.

Adrienne Terrizzi, Amherst resident, spoke on behalf of the Amherst League of Women Voters and urged the Council to postpone the vote on polling places to a later date.

John Page, Amherst resident, spoke about a discussion that was held after the 2018 elections, and about strategies to help turn out the vote.

José Lugo spoke about the need for Spanish language information for voters, spoke about accessibility issues at the high school, and COVID-19 concerns at a combined polling location.

Jonathan Sivel spoke about impact versus intention, and spoke in opposition to the combined polling location at the high school.

Lydia Irons spoke about disappointment about the Council's vote on the budget, and spoke about concerns with accessibility, urged the Council not to combine polling locations, and stated that a change in polling locations would disenfranchise her as a voter.

Town Clerk Shavena Martin stated that the Council must vote on a new voting location at least 20 days prior to an election. Early voting is scheduled to take place in the Bangs Center lobby.

Councilor Pam spoke about the reemergence of COVID-19 hot spots, and that ridesharing will not be an option due to COVID-19 concerns, the poll workers shifts must be shorter, and spoke in favor of the current polling locations and an increase in early voting opportunities.

Councilor Steinberg spoke about voters' knowledge of polling places and importance of consistency in locations, concerns about using Crocker Farm as a polling location, that the primary function of school buildings is to educate children, and that if we reduce polling locations and maintain multiple polling locations to the extent possible that consistency from September to November.

Councilor Brewer stated that if voters cannot come to the high school that voters can vote at an early voting location, that the Council does not determine early voting locations, and that the Council needs to make a decision tonight in order to allow as much time as possible to publicize the plan.

Councilor Hanneke agreed that a decision should be made tonight to allow more time for voter outreach, and expressed concern that the schools will not be available as polling locations, the Council cannot force the schools to open their buildings to voters, the Munson Library is very small, and the North Fire Station will not be available. The space the high school allows will give some measure of certainty to voters. The best option is the high school.

Councilor Swartz commented that it would be hard to find other polling places, we have to find a way to have as many polling places as we can, spoke about challenges of voting with children and health concerns.

Councilor Bahl-Milne spoke in favor of consistency in locations in September and November, report after the primaries, and in favor of figuring out a solution tonight.

Councilor Schoen suggested moving only some of the polling locations and keeping as many current locations as possible, spoke in opposition to consolidating all polling locations to one location. UMass doesn't want us on campus, wonder if Paul can work with UMass to have a location on campus. Many voices asking for more than one polling location.

MOTION: Councilor Ryan moved, second by Councilor Hanneke, to locate in-person voting on September 1, 2020 and November 3, 2020 for all ten voting precincts at Amherst-Pelham Regional High School, 21 Mattoon Street, as this will have no disparate adverse impact on access to the polls on the basis of race, national origin, disability, income or age.

Councilor Schoen stated that the Council cannot make the statement that it will not have a disparate impact.

Councilor Brewer spoke in favor of the motion, that retaining the current locations would also have an impact, and that the language is required when making a location change; students are back in Amherst in time to register for the primary, UMass should want students to vote, but that UMass cannot be a private polling place for students only.

Councilor Hanneke stated that an alternate motion must make the statement about race, income, etc. any time a polling location is changed. If Crocker is an issue the alternate motion would have the same disparate impact. The proposal is the least bad option.

Councilor Steinberg spoke about the School Committee's request not to use the schools for polling locations as decontamination would be needed after the election.

Town Manager Paul Bockelman stated that gyms are used for special education but that plans for schools are not finalized yet.

Councilor Pam asked if private locations could be used for polling locations.

Councilor Bahl-Milne asked about cleaning at schools, and that more polling locations would have less of an impact on access based on race, national origin, disability, income, or age.

Councilors discussed cleaning at the schools.

Councilor Schreiber stated that accessibility is an issue at every polling place, expressed concern about student voters and that those voters will be the most helped by voting at a single location.

Councilor Swartz spoke in opposition to the motion, stating that there is a majority of people who have barriers to access the polls, and spoke in favor of local polling places.

Councilor Bahl-Milne stated that local polling locations makes more sense.

VOTED 6-7 by roll call (Councilors Brewer, Hanneke, Ross, Ryan, Schreiber, and Steinberg voted Yes, Councilors Bahl-Milne, De Angelis, DuMont, Griesemer, Pam, Schoen, and Swartz voted No), the motion failed.

Councilor Hanneke asked about the report that the Council must post three days in advance of a vote to change polling locations.

Town Clerk Shavena Martin stated that a new report must be posted three days in advance of a vote.

MOTION: Hanneke moved, second by Schreiber, to reconsider the last vote under Council rule 7.5(b).

Councilors discussed the computation of time.

Councilor Swartz stated that if we had to vote yes because there is no other option, that is not a vote.

Councilor Bahl-Milne asked if the Council could meet tomorrow to vote.

Councilor Ross stated that there were not more options presented because the Council was in favor at the last meeting, spoke about the proposal as well-researched and that the Town Clerk should not be required to bring a new proposal.

Councilor Schoen stated that if the Council takes no action, then the current polling locations remain and the Council can make changes to locations prior to the Presidential Election.

Councilor Schreiber spoke in favor of voting the motion.

Councilor Bahl-Milne stated that the vote should not indicate a lack of respect for the Town Clerk's report.

Councilor Ryan stated that there is not enough room at the Bangs Center, the North Fire Station is not available, the School Superintendent has asked not to use Crocker school, and there are concerns with using the other schools.

Town Manager Paul Bockelman suggested taking an action tonight and potentially modifying the report.

Councilor Pam expressed concern regarding COVID-19 on Election Day.

Councilor Brewer stated different Massachusetts General Laws have different standards of computing time, the Council cannot just modify the report, that when we are only moving some of the people there would be a disparate impact on parts of Town--that is the definition of a disparate impact. The Town cannot default to normal, as the default is current locations and must open every location we have; we cannot demand to use the schools and we cannot choose to make the school committee close schools for three days to clean.

Councilor Schoen spoke about the computation of time and cannot accept the report in several sections.

Councilor Bahl-Milne spoke about a specific case that computed time a specific way.

VOTED 7-6 by roll call (Councilors Brewer, Griesemer, Hanneke, Ross, Ryan, Schreiber, and Steinberg voted Yes; Councilors Bahl-Milne, De Angelis, DuMont, Pam, Schoen, and Swartz voted No) to reconsider the last vote under Council rule 7.5(b).

MOTION ON THE FLOOR: To locate in-person voting on September 1, 2020 and November 3, 2020 for all ten voting precincts at Amherst-Pelham Regional High School, 21 Mattoon Street, as this will have no disparate adverse impact on access to the polls on the basis of race, national origin, disability, income or age.

VOTED 7-6 by roll call (Councilors Brewer, Griesemer, Hanneke, Ross, Ryan, Schreiber, and Steinberg voted Yes; Councilors Bahl-Milne, De Angelis, DuMont, Pam, Schoen, and Swartz voted No) to locate in-person voting on September 1, 2020 and November 3, 2020 for all ten voting precincts at Amherst-Pelham Regional High School, 21 Mattoon Street, as this will have no disparate adverse impact on access to the polls on the basis of race, national origin, disability, income or age.

MOTION: President Griesemer moved, second by Councilor Hanneke, to authorize the warrant for the State Primary Election on Tuesday, September 1, 2020, with polls open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm at the following location:

All Voting Precincts: Amherst-Pelham Regional High School, 21 Mattoon Street

VOTED 8-5 by roll call (Councilors Brewer, De Angelis, Griesemer, Hanneke, Ross, Ryan, Schreiber, and Steinberg voted Yes; Councilors Bahl-Milne, DuMont, Pam, Schoen, and Swartz voted No) to authorize the warrant for the State Primary Election on Tuesday, September 1, 2020, with polls open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm at the following location:


